BUSINESS:

The Board reviewed the proposed 2018 Agreement with C.T. Male Associates for engineering services for the Town.

MOTION by Councilman Orsini, Seconded by Councilman Mercier to renew the Agreement with C.T. Male Associates for engineering services for 2018 **ALL AYES**

The Board reviewed the Countryside Veterinary Hospital Agreement with the changes made by the Animal Control Officer.

Todd Humiston: The fees are the same as last year; we just needed to change paragraph 3 from 9 days to 5 days for the holding period. Also, we have nothing that covers seized dogs in police related matters. The Local Law should be modified to include that which will save on bond hearing fees in the future.

Supervisor Middleton: Is there an alternative to putting seized dogs down if the owners do not claim them?

Todd Humiston: Countryside has a 100% adoption rate, Dr. Keller and his staff go above and beyond to try and re-home the animals unless they pose a threat of some sort. Also our fines and fees are so low at \$25.00 that the cost benefit is not there, court costs are not covered by that which is why I try every way possible to not write tickets if I can solve it another way.

MOTION by Councilman Fisher, Seconded by Councilman Mercier to renew the Agreement with Countryside Veterinary Hospital for 2018 **ALL AYES**

Supervisor Middleton: The Village received a quote for flooring in the court foyer, courtroom and police station totaling \$10,200.00 from Mike Pollock. The Board agreed to place the quote on file due to other expenses in the foreseeable future that may take precedence.

Supervisor Middleton: The Town has received 2 quotes for cleaning services for the Town & Village Offices; the Village has not received any but are working on it. The Town Board would like to table the discussion until Village quotes are received and a reference is obtained from Irving Tissue for one of the interested parties.

CORRESPONDENCE:

Supervisor Middleton: I received correspondence from Assemblywoman Carrie Woerner asking if she could put the Town in for a grant for Qualified Opportunity Zones. No match is required. Each State may nominate as Qualified Opportunity Zones up to 25% of communities that are income eligible.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Brian Brockway: We are having issues with the Post Office again. The employees are supposed to park out behind the Firehouse and they are not. Apparently one of the employees was upset and reported to Aimee that he got intentionally plowed in. I did not plow him in intentionally and it would have never happened if he parked where he was supposed to as per the agreement that was made when the parking lot was redone.

Councilman Orsini: Why doesn't the Post Office have parking for their employees? They could plow out behind there and have plenty of parking.

Brian Brockway: As far as recycling goes I have nothing new, I cannot find anyone that will take it.

Supervisor Middleton: What do the recycling employees do the rest of the week?

Brian Brockway: Tom works on the trucks and Jack gets called in for storms to do the sidewalks. He is only part time.

Supervisor Middleton: I asked Mayor Traver what they pay for their recycling bins and it's around \$1,053.00/month. It's \$175.00 to dump them and they average around 6 a month.

Brian Brockway: It's cheaper doing what we are doing right now.

Supervisor Middleton: My issue is we are giving the illusion that we are recycling when we aren't

Brian Brockway: The Government mandate states that legally we have to offer recycling.

Supervisor Middleton: If we go in with the Village then residents will have here and the transfer station as options.

Councilman Orsini: The Village bins fill up in 3 days now. We are facing some big decisions in the near future regarding garbage and recycling.

Brian Brockway: Our tonnage hasn't changed in 3 or 4 years. I say you put some heat on the private haulers and make them pay a fee and you may get some customers back.

Mary-Ellen Stockwell: The Village requires a license fee & proof of insurance per their local law. They have also regulated the days of pickup. Doing that makes it a code enforcement issue also as well as legal and time costs. The haulers license can be in jeopardy if they do not follow the regulations.

Brian Brockway: The Town & Village looks like a dump with the cans all over the place.

BOARD: Review the recycling mandate before making any decisions

Supervisor Middleton: We bought Code Enforcement Officer Matt French a new printer to help with organization and Mary-Ellen met with him to stream line the process of taking someone to court on a violation to help save time and expenses.

Mary-Ellen Stockwell: We will be resolving the 1 case before us tomorrow and they will be fined.

Councilman Orsini: I was speaking to a nice couple at The Anvil the other night and it happened to be the parents of the child that was killed in the tragic accident in Greenwich

involving snow removal. They told me that they have 1 goal right now which is to ask that every driver during snow removal get down and do a visual assessment before dumping.

Brian Brockway: We do not do any snow hauling like that, we dump ours in big open fields but I totally agree.

Supervisor Middleton: The roads are looking good in the Town; the guys are doing a great job.

Mary-Ellen Stockwell: What would the Board like me to do with the letter from C.T. Male regarding our solar local law if anything?

Supervisor Middleton: I believe it was because we were approached by a solar company that was interested in the old dump.

Councilman Orsini: I believe de-commissioning was an issue when it was brought up in the past, also methane removal in old dumps is being talked about so what would happen then? Would it have to be torn down?

Mary-Ellen Stockwell: I received notice that Larry Clute is ready to come back before the Planning Board with his proposal for senior housing on the Williams farm property. They are on the agenda for February 28th.

Brian Brockway: I would suggest that they loop the 2 water lines if they do that. Both Hudson Ave. and Juliet St. are dead ends and include Sullivan Parkway also. The water quality will be a lot better if you get rid of the dead ends.

Mary-Ellen Stockwell: I will speak directly to the engineer and the applicant and also have them speak directly with Brian.

Supervisor Middleton: The Champlain Hudson Power Express went to the County to discuss where the power lines go through and broke down the assessments for 2021 as follows:

Town: \$50,000.00 Village: \$70,000.00 County: \$80,000.00 School: \$215,000.00

PUBLIC COMMENT: None

Supervisor Middleton: WCC, LLC has offered to sit down and negotiate assessment. I asked them who they were going to use and they asked who we wanted them to use. I believe this is the best road to go down, our new Assessor is not very enthused about it but it is a unique property.
